China's societal self-improvement in preparation for the 2008 Olympics continues. The Beijing Tourism Bureau ordered hotels to re-translate English signs, hoping to avoid such notorious past gaffes as "Racist Park." which is now "Park of Ethnic Minorities," and a cafe's attempt to salute Western visitors with "Welcome, big nose friends." And the Beijing Olympics Committee has been training hostesses for months to stand in military-like precision, straight enough to hold a sheet of paper between their knees, and to smile continuously, showing "six to eight teeth" (even if placing a chopstick in the mouth sideways is necessary for practice). There are height and weight requirements for the hostesses, and each must have an upper-to lower-body ratio of no more than 11-to-13, to eliminate, according to local newspapers, "big bottoms.'

Too Much Time on Their Hands



Contes said the oversight was inadvertent but that she is now shunned within the community for her grave offense and called "labelwhore,

First, Arkansas Tech University canceled outright its production of the Stephen Sondheim play "Assassins" (containing some violence) because of "recent tragic events" on campuses but then relented because of the hard work that the students had already put in. In February, the production was staged in full, one time, to an audience solely of participants' families, who presumably could handle the violence. However, even that showing took place without the play's prescribed guns, even though they were only wooden props. (The "guns" were later discarded but only after being sawed in half.

Accidents Will HappenPolice officer Thomas Wilson pleaded guilty to having 8,742 images of child pornography on his computer, but the judge acknowledged that Wilson might have acquired them "somewhat accidentally" (Brisbane, Australia; March).

Ernest Simmons was convicted of attempted murder of two sheriff's deputies despite his defense that he only "accidentally" shot at them (11 times, using two guns) (Orlando, January).

Accused purse-snatcher Derrick Dale, 21, said that the purse fell on his foot and (according to the arrest report) "the next thing he knew, (it) was in his hands" (Destin, Fla., January).

Least Competent Criminals This Getaway Plan Works Better in July: James Jett, 33, was arrested in Blount County, Tenn., in February after attempting to evade police by jumping into the Little River and submerging all but his face. A 36-year-old man faced several charges after allegedly masturbating on a woman's bicycle seaf (explaining that he felt "an overwhelming calm" when he smelled the handlebars of a woman's

bike) (Ostersund, Sweden; February)

A building contractor was caught by a security guard simulating sex with a canister vacuum cleaner (and claiming that he was merely vacuuming his underpants, which he said was a "common practice" in his native Poland)

People continue to purposely maim themselves in various schemes. Daniel Kuch allegedly had a friend shoot him in the shoulder so he could get time off work (and was arrested for telling police that it was a drive-by) (Pasco, Wash., February), And Elizabeth Hingston, 24, let her boyfriend break her leg by jumping on it so that the pair could claim insurance proceeds worth the equivalent of \$200,000 (Plymouth, England November). And Zachary Booso, 19, shot himself in the cheek, shoulder and thigh so that he could brag to his friends and ex-girlfriend that he is involved with gangs (Brownsburg, Ind., March)

Undignified Deaths

A 39-year-old man who had been cited 32 times for driving without a seat belt (and who finally rigged a fake belt in his car to create the illusion that he was belted in) was killed in a low-impact car crash that would not have been fatal to a belted driver (Okata, New Zealand; coroner's inquest, February). And a 74-year-old man died of hypothermia after sneaking out of a nursing home at 4:30 a.m. to smoke (Winnipeg, Manitoba January). And a man and a woman were fatally struck by several vehicles on the Trans-Canada Highway after they had continued a fight from their stopped car out to the middle of the road (Chilliwack, British Columbia: February).

Irish director-playwright Paul Walker's production of "Ladies & Gents" opened for a March run in New York City 29 blocks north of Broadway in a public restroom. According to an Associated Press report, the entire play takes place among the porcelain in a bathroom in Central Park, portraying "the seedy underside of 1950s Dublin," with the audience of 25 standing beside rows of stalls, near "spiders, foul odors and puddles of questionable origin." Walker proudly admits that he wanted to take the audience "out of their comfort zone" to create "a different energy." Actor John O'Callaghan recalled that rehearsals were especially difficult "One man actually came in and had a pee right in

of childhood



Rock City: the city of rocks (unincorporated). A tourist trap with a dark side. It's a little known fact that Rock City is run by an underground gang of gnomes. Stay on the path, keep to the straight and narrow, and, if you see one, never, never look him in the eye. Sure they may look all cute and innocent, but there is something sinister, almost evil in their playfulness. Or maybe I just have lawn ornament issues.

Lookout Mountain is one of those areas where you're just skipping along and all of a sudden-BAM-- you're in a different state. Rock City is actually in Georgia. Usually tourist areas are full of happy vacationers, folks decked out in their finest tacky vacation apparel (which for some reason usually includes shorts, regardless of the outside temperature), arms full of cameras, children on sugar highs.

But not here.

I've seen happier people in rush hour traffic. I'm guessing the ticket machines set the pace. Ticket machines must be one of the circles of hell for the non-computer literate (for the people waiting in line behind them as well). The waiting area was a jumbled mess of failed attempts at buying tickets, keeping groups together, and shouting at missing family members. Seriously, people were just freaking out, frantically saving seats on the train.

Being confronted with this much stress, we did what a normal, rational person would: we got a case of the giggles.

Everyone did seem to calm down once the train started. Or is it a cable car? It runs on rails and cables near as I can tell. I mean, it couldn't just run on rails. It would need a space shuttle engine to make it straight up Lookout Mountain, and on the way down...well let's just say it would go so fast that you'd be at the bottom before you left the top.

Walking distance from the top is Point Park. It was built in 1905 near the Civil War



"Battle Above the Clouds" site, and contains monuments, a museum, and memorabilia. Unfortunately, I didn't go. The day can only hold so much adventure.

You can also walk to Rock City from here. There are signs posted, but I'm ashamed to say that I did not. I wasn't sure of the actual distance and it was a little chilly. I opted to ride the Incline down and drive to the Rock City parking lot. Apparently I'm a fair weather adventurer.

Finally we got to Rock City Gardens. It's absolutely beautiful. Pretty rock paths, waterfalls, and the location of an all out fight between the gods. (That last statement may actually have only happened in a Neil Gaiman

Rock City has been around since rocks were invented. Sure, a few things have been added. I doubt the likelihood of a natural souvenir stand formation, but for the most part, it's all natural. It is a walking tour, so if you don't wear comfy shoes, no one will feel sorry for you and your sore feet. You will then be forced to sit on one of the benches throughout the park


that can best be described as "forged in evil.' They creep me out. They just do.

My favorite part was the Swing-A-Long Bridge. A suspension bridge. Oh, I do love a good suspension bridge. Jump jump jump. Run run run. (I wouldn't recommend doing that, but I did anyway. Do as the adventurer says, not as she does. A fall will equal death. Not suitable for acrophobes.)

It's a long trail, and each little area has a name. One group of rocks is called the Fat Man's Squeeze (it is quite narrow). There's a Goblin's Underpass, a Lover's Leap (complete with legend), and a viewing area where you can see seven states (not Hawaii). They also have transplanted wildflowers and a ton of plants (with labels), and even have their own deer. Deer Park is home to the rare Fallow deer, imported from Europe in the 30s.

It's quite breathtaking, that is, until you get underground. Underneath the beauty that is Rock City Gardens lies nightmare fuel. Gnomes. Way back when in the early days of Rock City, there was a woman named Frieda Carter who was very interested in European folklore (her husband Garnet is the one that pioneered the "See Rock City" barn sign.) At the end of the Rock City trail is an underground cave area known as Fairyland Caverns. It is a little folklore wonderland...with black lights! Gnomes, fairy tales reenacted by statues. One area has music and about every nursery rhyme ever. Kids love it. I, however, am deeply disturbed by some of it. I'm sorry, but gnomes on a ferris wheel are just unnatural...yet terribly hypnotic.

So that's my trip to Lookout Mountain. I missed a few things so a return trip isn't out of the question. But for now I will sit and wait for a gnome anti-defamation group to subpoena me, or kidnap me in the night (I sure hope the Valley Planet pays the ransom).



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A True Treasure is Lost by Sonny Edwards A Tribute to Spanky Alford Spanky Alford

Chalmers Edward Alford (or as most of us knew him) Spanky May 22,1955 - March 24, 2008

n Tuesday, March 25th I got the dreaded news from several sources that Spanky had crossed over. It wasn't so much a surprise as a shock to my system. I had known for years of Spanky's deteriorating health, but still I was not prepared for the pain I experienced when Donnie Cox first gave me the news. Marcus Pope supplied the details of the service.

The world, and our community of musicians, has given up yet another of our musical treasures at far too young an age. The loss to his immediate family is beyond measure. For all of that I have deep regret. The greater loss, perhaps, is not that of a music industry icon however, but rather of one of the most decent, kind, honorable and humble men who ever lived.

I want to try to describe Spanky for those of you who were not fortunate enough to know him personally, but this is hard to do in mere words. Maybe because I have all these visions of his expressions and reactions to things, or maybe because Spanky's life was

so musical it seemed more like a soundtrack, and you have to hear a soundtrack. How do you try to explain, to someone who didn't hear it for themselves, a guy who, while most noted for his incredible jazz guitar phrasings on hollow body jazz boxes, could pick up any kind of guitar and play any style, as if he had invented and perfected the genre himself. To call him simply amazing doesn't begin to do him justice. In fact any praise I might utter is gross understatement. I suggest you Google Spanky and enjoy some of what you find. Spanky was credited on different albums under different names. When you search, search for Spanky Alford, Eddie "Spanky" Alford, Chalmers "Spanky" Alford, and combinations.

Afford, and combinations.

He was one of the true GREAT people I have had the privilege to call my friend. Not just the masterful guitarist, considered by many to be one of the world's best jazz guitarist, but also the great and wonderful man. Spanky was always giving to others, responding to the constant request of his time, talents, and resources. Regardless of how exhausted and in need of rest, or how much pain he might be in, he always responded positively. I don't believe I ever knew anyone whose life was more a reflection of the love and peace of Jesus Christ. Spanky is home now. He will be sorely missed by all who knew him and his music, but never forgotten.

Spanky was so many things to so many people. A loving husband to his beautiful wife, Shirley. A proud father and grandfather. A true friend to many people all across this country and beyond. He was a good listener. If you had a problem, and needed to find a solution, he was a great advisor. If you had a story to share he was attentive. If it was a funny story he made it all the more so with his response. His smile and laughter were priceless. As in everything Spanky, his timing was flawless. And he had fantastic and funny stories of his own.

He was also very spiritual and one of the most generous souls I ever knew. Once as we were walking down the sidewalk, we passed a fellow sitting down we had never seen before. After a few steps Spanky said "wait a minute". I saw him turn around, walk up and introduce himself, and inquire if everything was all right with the man. Upon learning the young man was depressed and going through a hard time, he found a quiet and private place to sit, and talked with the guy for over an hour, really listening to him, encouraging him, offering advice and trying to instill a bit of hope. I saw and spoke with that young man a couple of years later and he confided in me that Spanky had saved his life. He said he was seriously considering suicide and had made the decision to go through with it, and a few moments later Spanky walked past him turned and walked back and asked if he was O.K. When I told Spanky about my conversation with the young man, he played down his own significance, and just said, "Something told me that kid needed to talk to somebody". We never spoke of it again.

I could write for days and not run short of

interesting, sometimes funny or outright amazing stories about Spanky. I would, however, rather share a few comments by others about what Spanky meant to their lives. I recorded these statements at a musical memorial and tribute held for Spanky at Saint Luke's Missionary Baptist Church on Friday night, March 28. Well before the program began it was standing room only with an estimated crowd of nearly two thousand. A host of great musicians and artists from near and far were present to pay their respects in song, poems and by sharing memories of Spanky. The performances were tremendous and deeply moving. One after another stepped up to the mic to describe the details of how Spanky had played on their album, helped with their career, made connections for them, encouraged them, personally enriching their lives. And most made reference to what a spiritually uplifting and healing effect Spanky had brought to their lives. There were many funny tales of everyday experiences, from the studio and the road. These were people who knew Eddie "Spanky" Alford as a colleague, collaborator, as a man with a wonderful sense of humor and most importantly as a dear and cherished friend. An emotional throng of friends and fans hung on every word, with the occasional

The comments below were made about Spanky after the program by some of those in attendance, and reflect the high regard of his peers and fans.

"I met Spanky around 1982, when he started the gospel group Sons of Christ. He was my guitar teacher. I was amazed at how he could play everything by George Benson. Spanky was the most inspirational guitar player I ever ran across. He was patient, kind, and would teach you anything you wanted to learn. When I heard the news of Spanky's death I was just crushed, like my heart just

fell on the ground, and there's still a big empty spot in my soul right now that Spanky is gone. His legacy will live on through all these musicians he touched, not only in the Huntsville area, but nationwide. Spanky, from Leshone, rest in peace." - Leshone Lankford

"He meant to me what he meant to everyone else, and that was just pure music, love, the pure essence of both, and we'll miss him"

"Spanky was really an awesome guy, an awesome musician, and an awesome pool player, a really nice guy who loved God. He taught me about playing in the pocket and I just really appreciated knowing him."

"I actually had the pleasure of playing with Spanky, and I just like the whole atmosphere he would bring with him when he would play, because he knew what he was gonna do before we knew what we were gonna do, and while we would be on stage trying to decide what song we were gonna play, Spanky would just go ahead and start playing a song and everybody would just join in. It was Spanky's show and he knew how to keep everybody in order. That's what I remember most about Spanky" - Reggie Smith, Saxophonist

"I first played with Spanky when I was about 17 or 18 years old. I had seen him at the Jazz Factory. It was the most fun I'd ever had on a gig, at that age. I didn't know who I was playing with at the time, if I had I probably would have just gotten up and left, or choked, but Spanky was a great man. The guy had music flowing through his veins, and every note he played was right from his soul, and translated. I think he left more of an impact on people than probably he ever knew. He'll be missed." - Brian Palmieri, drummer

"I just wanted to say I really enjoyed working with Spanky and playing around with him, he was an inspiration to my life. I love him and I'll always have him in my heart." – Shawn Moore, saxophone player

"Spanky, he was my everything when it comes to music. He taught me when I was an infant, and I grew into a music ministry through him. "- Alvin Kirby, bass player

"Spanky was a wonderful guy. I never knew a musician who knew as much music and could play as well as he did, he was just unreal. I saw him a couple of weeks ago, walked into the store where he was teaching at T. Shepards, and he said "You got your guitar?" I told him no, and he told me to get one off the wall. He gave me a lesson right there on the spot. I asked him what I owed him and he just waved me off and said, "You don't owe me nothin'." That's just how Spanky was. He was such a genuine fellow, and I loved him to death." - Josh Oliver, friend and guitar student

"Spanky was definitely a good friend of mine. I met him in 1985 and we traveled the road together with The Mighty Clouds of Joy. One thing I will have to say about Spanky, i you came to any quartet show, you could find Spanky in any dressing room, and Spanky would have a crowd surrounding him, and he was gonna be serenading people, playing anything from Country & Western to Gospel to Jazz to the Beverly Hillbillies- Spanky just did it all. I'm just so glad to be here to support my brother and his wife, Shirley. Thank God for the angels God has blessed her with and Brother Spanky, we love you man, we love you Shirley and we'll see you on the other side, Uncle Eddie - Alphonso "Cheese Burger" McClain, Mighty Clouds

"Spanky played with me for a lot of years, and I always knew that he was a genius on the guitar, and a great, great person. We talked constantly, and we had just talked two weeks ago about him playing on the new project we've got coming out soon, and he was mentioning some songs he wanted me to do, and he was gonna help me with. I'd just like to say to Huntsville, and to everyone who might read this article, it's a great loss to have lost Eddie Alford, better known as Spanky. He is going to be missed." - Joe Ligon, lead singer and founding member Mighty Clouds of Joy

"Spanky worked along with me here at St. Luke's Church. He was also planning to play on my project that's coming up with college and high school gospel choirs. I went to him and said I had an idea to do a recording, and I wanted him to play on it because of his expertise and he was working with me on that project. I'm not in the field of music, but I always admired him for what he did, and the different people he helped. When he got sick, many times when he was going through his trials and tribulations, I would be there to try and encourage him. I'd try to say some things that would comfort him but he was the kind of guy, when you tried to encourage him, he'd wind up encouraging you. He never complained regardless of what his situation might be, he was a straight up fellow and he always talked about Jesus He was a man with a Christian heart and he shared his love. He loved his family, his wife, and his children. They say he was a legend, and I don't know what a legend is supposed to be about, but I know he was a beautiful human being. We are all going to miss him and I just ask everyone to pray



for his wife and family and heal them. One thing I know, he still lives in our hearts, and when we reflect on some of the things or conversations it brings a smile to your face and I love him and he will always live in my heart." Deacon Alford, Spanky's cousin.



DR ANARCHO'S **Rx for Old Stuff That Don't Suck**

Mark Knopfler placed only 27th in Rolling Stone magazine's 100 Top Rock Guitarists of All Time poll. I thought he got short shrift. His virtuosity aside, his originality alone should have placed him in the top ten. But they didn't ask my opinion then and I'm sure they couldn't care less what I think now.

Besides his work with Dire Straits, Knopfler's solo albums are further proof of his genius.

Some songwriters' works have a common sound / style that makes their work instantly recognizable as "them." This isn't necessarily a bad thing, just a fact.

Knopfler's songs are different enough in scope: style and feel as to sometimes make it hard to believe the same guy wrote them all. Sure he wrote "Sultan's of Swing," but you may or may not realize that he also wrote Tina Turner's smash hit, "Private Dancer." It's easy to understand why Mark Knopfler is, in addition to all his other accomplishments, a much sought-after film score composer.

Dire Straits took off with rocket speed in a time otherwise dominated by disco music on the one hand and punk on the other. They proved there were still enough people left with musical taste to support real rock done right. They have gone on to become one of rock's most highly respected bands.

For all of Dire Straits' popularity they are a group that never toured extensively. Some think this may be because their legendary reputation as a "fighting band" may be true. It's said they can hardly get along long enough to make studio albums, much less suffer

For me, that's a pity. I love live performances and recordings of them. I like to know a group can actually do it in real time and doesn't depend on studio magic and lip-sync like the Milli Vanilli's, Britney Spears, and Christina Aguileras of the world.

Dire Straits can definitely do it. That's why they are:

Dr. Anarcho's Rx for Old Stuff That Don't Suck: Dire Straits – Alchemy. I This 2 Disc set was released in June of 1996. It's an import and that makes it rather pricey.

You may note that although it's two CDs, there are only 11 songs total. As you might expect, the live versions of the songs are expanded and rearranged with extended solos and more of Knopfler's guitar wizardry. Three of the tracks run in excess of 10 minutes and one of them clocks in at 13-plus. The total playing time of the set is 1.5 hours. Rest assured you'll feel like you got your money's worth.

In the introduction to Dire Straits' greatest hits album, "Sultans of Swing," British music journalist Robert Sandall wrote, "Anybody who finds nothing to love here has either got a problem with the essential fabric of rock and roll or cloth ears."

He is right about that and Alchemy proves it further. Alchemy is a must for any serious Dire Straits / Mark Knopfler fan and a great introduction for the casual listener. What's not to love? It's an hour and a half of musical magic

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

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On the Red Carpet

Tould you buy a new rug, rolled ould you ouy a new rug, rome up, from an expensive interior decorator, if you were not allowed to see the design? Or a bargain rug from a thrift store, with promise, yet still unrolled to reveal the inside

Tripping hard over a new Person of Interest (P.O.I.), without plush floor covering to break the fall, men and women both tend to be guilty of buying the rolled rug, without viewing the pattern inside. Oooh, the anxiety! Will the patterns of character, interests, and behavior match my relationship color scheme? What if the rug's worn from years of rolling luggage (baggage), or stains from bleeding hearts? Things that cannot be resolved, from the carpet cleaner namesake, nor the best of relationship therapists.

Fifi offers the following advice: Observe the rolled rug from the outside first. Is it worn from partying? Or has its shell been Scotch guarded? Is it rough around the edges, or softened with fringe (benefits)? Ask politely probing questions about the inside, to see what you can. Family history: "Have you been featured on "Antiques Road Show"? Relationship history: "Do you have any stains, either from a wounded heart, or

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other less mentionables which are visible only under a black light?" "Have you lain beside similar rugs, or tend to hang out with runners"? Stability: "Have you moved frequently, are you fixed adhesively?"

Once the assessment has been made decide if you want to purchase, but only with the return policy established: this product may be returned due only to manufactured defects. It will take time to discover the defects, major or minor, as all rugs have them Some defects are better disguised by intricate patterns of masked behaviors that seem so enticing in the beginning, yet unravel rapidly once past the deadline to return. Others have more subtle defects, with less severity, while maintaining aesthetic appeal; are worth keeping. Even if they form fabric balls when you try to vacuum them, or beat them to make them the shape rug you

Unroll the rug slowly; it's a relationship you cannot rush. If you've observed carefully you'll be happily walking the red carpet. Blinded only by paparazzi flashbulbs, instead of a P.O.I. who lies like a rug!

Get Back to Your Roots With Backwater by Southern Tracks

outhern Tracks is always on the lookout for great music and it's even better when we find it close to home. Ask Backwater where they play and they will tell you anywhere that has electricity. That says it all about four guys who dream of making it big and have the talent and the drive to get there. Heavy on the country with some great southern rock thrown in for good measure, this is a band you don't want to miss. Brian Dawson belts on lead vocals and plays rhythm, Chris Eldridge rocks lead guitar and backup vocals, Tim O'Brien iams bass and backup vocals and Jason Miller keeps them all in line on the drums.

We met the guys from Backwater at Bishop's, a local hole-in-the-wall, and had a chance to talk about their history, influences, and trying to break into the music industry. They've all been playing "since dirt was around" but only together for a little over a year. You wouldn't know it from hearing them play though. It's apparent these guys draw a crowd with voices in the audience singing along to not only the covers but their own tunes as well like "That's the Stuff", "Come On Birmingham" and "I Don't Hate You Anymore.

ST: How do you select your covers?

Brian: This kinda started out as Chris and I taking a looking at modern country tunes, what we dug, what we like, what could help get us off the ground... the beauty of this is we get to do what we like but at the same time, it's good stuff that the crowd understands and digs...

Jason: A lot of it stems from rock, southern rock, stuff we grew up on...

ST: Obviously the crowd loves it, we spoke with a few guys out in the crowd and asked them what do you like most about Backwater and they told us the original songs, I think you guys are just on the verge... tell us what's going on with the demo

Brian: We have our first demo recording out, it's three songs and it got a touch of radio play We're working on our up and coming one, it's probably going to be a four song EP, it's got some really strong songs on it, one of which we've been told is going to take us where we want to go...

Chris: We actually got signed to a production deal about five or six months ago... we got the demo out from a guy named Jimmy Nutt... we cut some songs, sent them out to a bunch of different record labels... they passed the first time but we got a lot of fans out of it, you know... and the second go 'round he thinks it may be a little better... and 93.3 the Wolf s behind us quite a bit, so we'll see... We're lucky, you know, to be together only a year, year and a half, and (we) get to play together four or five nights a week... it's a pretty good bit so I'm pretty excited about it.

ST: So how does it work? One night you might be playing Bishop's and that face in the crowd vou've never seen...

Brian: That's exactly it... you play every gig like it's the one, you know, you try to anyway...
you play like someone who matters is going to see you and scoop you up, that's what you do, you try to do every one of them like that.

ST: You guys are opening for David Allen Coe, how did that come about?

Chris: That came about through Sammy Taylor and also our booking agency. I've been playing with Sammy and Jay (Jason Miller) off and on since Sammy's was a hallway... in different bands, The Land - with the guys from Heartland, we played in Black Label together, we were the founding members... hell man, we've just been around a long time, since Sammy started basically and anytime something cool comes through, he (Sammy)

tries to help us out... help me out y'all...

Brian: You pretty much summed it up man We've worked real hard here in North Alabama and of course our hometown to try to get people on our side, people who appreciate us working so hard to get to where we're going... we're not trying to step on anyone's toes... but we work real hard for everybody and if you do it long enough it will pay off...

ST: Tell us about your influences. Obviously you guys are country but there's a lot of rock in there... (to Chris) you're the eighties hair band guy right?

Chris: (Laughing) Very much... man I love love love all the eighties hair metal guys. I think that Mick Mars (from) Motley Crue is one of the best freakin' guitar players, very good slide player but also my roots are very Southern, you know what I mean? So Skynyrd, Allman Brothers, all that kind of stuff. My great-grandfather, I.D. Stanford played with Bill Monroe, so bluegrass is a big deal, so as I get older... just kinda goes back to where you come from I guess. So here I am, pretty excited about it, happy to be with these guys, they all understand what's going on... real happy to be here.

ST: Good deal... Mr. Mike right?

ST: Tim, I'm sorry, drummer.

Tim: Bass player (laughter ensues) all us white folk look the same, you know how that

ST: Yeah, we've only had about twelve shots tonight, you guys are forcing us to drink... after every second song 'DRINK!! DRINK!!'

Tim: That's part of it, that's our job man, that's what we do

ST: Ok, influences?

Tim: Alright, I'm a bass player, influences let's see, there's quite a few...gosh, I started out playing lead guitar years ago. So lots and lots of eighties rock, same stuff Chris listened to and played. Then I came down to this area, Tennessee, Alabama... and got more into bass... got really into funk, funk rock... Mother's Finest, Chili Peppers, stuff like that...

ST: Claypool?

Tim: Claypool, oh yeah oh yeah.... just, you know, playing all that cool shit.... and actually I was playing in a party band with Chris and he got me into this stuff and I've been having a lot of fun with it.... modern country's some cool stuff, good vocals, good songs, well written, lots of fun to play..

ST: You guys are getting a little edgy, you're taking the covers and just really putting an edge on them and it's nice

Chris: Have you guys ever been to a new country concert, ever seen Dierks Bentley or any of those guys... if you see these guys it's like Marshalls, Les Pauls, it's like an AC/DC concert in '86.

ST: All right, influences (to Jason).

Jason: Grew up on southern rock, 80s metal. I'm returning back to my roots, the older I get.. go back and listen to all the old classic stuff But I like everything from grunge to funk to southern... a little bit of everything. I've had the opportunity to play with a lot of bands and I've had to learn all kinds of music... so I'm not near as anal as I used to be about what I want to hear



or listen to, cuz as long as your privileged to play then hey, you can't ask for anything more.

Brian: Early on, I was raised on country, a little bit of bluegrass. As time wore on, I got into a little bit of rock 'n roll... I was pretty big into the Seattle scene for quite a bit, kinda got past that and started focusing on other things. Just like what Jay said, as time wears on, I'm kinda getting back to my roots and really what I'm

And that's what it's all about, getting back to your roots. People love music for a lot of different reasons. There's something about country that pulls you in, maybe it's that familiar story or maybe it's just the feeling that you're home. Whatever it is, Backwater brings it.

Stretching the Creative Envelope by Bonnie Roberts

Priday, March 28, I held a poetry soiree in my home for my dear friend and talented poet, Irene Latham. Irene has just published her first volume of poetry, What Came Before, with Negative Capability Press

Irene is an envelope stretcher's envelope stretcher. And that's just one reason I love her poetry. She doesn't hold back in what she wants to say, even though she uses restraint in not telling the story, but allowing the images to speak for themselves. Just when one thinks she has taken a metaphor or an idea as far as she can, she pushes it just a little bit more.

Further. Irene is not afraid to be who she is or to say who she is. To me, that is one of the essential marks of an outstanding writer.

What writer would not want to stretch the creative envelope? Middle is boring. Middle doesn't challenge. Middle may not cause a ruckus, but it is like walking down a stretch of interstate concrete with only "Eat at Bob's" billboards to keep one company.

Even in her choice of topics, Irene goes to the edge: "Why Moths Have No Mouths" is one of her titles, and one of my favorite poems from this collection. In the poem, she compares human passion and need to the moth's "hunger pangs

How simple it must be then when she catches a delicious scent calling from across the field to transfer one hunger to another, to put all her energy into speaking this new language of lust, to send and receive messages in which no wrong



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no misunderstandings. just two creatures starving and finding solace in the dark.

And in "First Day of Winter," listen to this poet push the edges of the creative envelope:

Somewhere glaciers that haven't/moved for hundreds of years/shift ever so slightly, give/birth to currents only lantern fish see. Somewhere the last leaf drops/unnoticed from the limb of a dogwood, /lands square on the back of a beetle/who stills at the sudden shade. --Irene Latham, copyright 2007

The poet could have used simply the word "fish." Instead, she says "only lantern fish see." Immediately, the reader is pushed further into the realm of the poet's world. The word "lantern" itself evokes ideas of seeking in the dark, or experiences the reader may have had using a lantern, and, thereby, adding more ayers of richness to the poem.

The poet could have said "a leaf dropped from the limb of a tree and landed on an insect." Okay, but not nearly as compelling as her choice to "stretch" the imagery further, to make each image specific. It is the "last" leaf of the limb that lands "square" on the "dogwood"

Irene Latham lives in Birmingham. She is the mother of three sons. Irene won the 2008 Alabama Book of the Year Award from the ASPS



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


Auntie Jen's Animal Crazy




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7:00 a.m.-9:30 a.m. 11:00 a.m.-2:00 p.m. There's nothing more comfortable than a mom and pop establishment, whether it be a little Hungarian restaurant in Chicago, a little Italian café in Naples, or an off-road Cajun eatery in some nook in NOLA. It's a phenomenon that marries well with Southern

WildRose Café has that feel; a little beyond the typical "meat-and-three" restaurant, but with a heavy touch of hometown in its atmosphere: you enter the front door and



are immediately surrounded by posters and other PR materials from area plays, musical theatre, dance recitals, and more, with representations of Mardi Gras and other festive occasions, as well. Owner Diane Hollingsworth is surely a supporter of the arts.

An upstairs area gives a more private dining spot, while downstairs has the keen feel of old times in its bar area, the type of seating that makes you want to call somebody Daddio and order a malted. You order, you sit a bit, and then you pick up your food at the end of said bar

Recently, John and "Nose" Barisa and I visited the little café on Northside Square. I ordered the Shepherd's Pie (let's face it, the Anglos are well represented in the genetics of the South and I love pub foods), blackeyed peas, a marinated artichoke salad, and the combread, the latter based on a recommendation of one of the employees. The Barisas had chicken breast with white sauce - nothing says North Alabama like white sauce - mashed potatoes and gravy, yams, and a nice, fluffy-looking biscuit. Not quite cathead which is fine with me but big enough to satiate your cravings for the "staff of life."

My Shepherd's pie was delicious and, though I'm not a connoisseur of onions by a long shot, the favoritism shown to this particular entrée by the locals is well deserved; it was a nice-sized helping, to boot. I never knew shepherds were so tender. The black-eyed peas were good, not salty, not bland, but middle-of-the-road spiced. Another welcomed side was the salad, with a very piquant vinaigrette. I love artichokes, so one would be hard pressed to concoct a way in which I wouldn't devour them. Recommended or not, the cornbread I found a bit dry; on the flip side, John's biscuit looked inviting enough to bring me back for breakfast, and soon. There are a lot of breakfast biscuit options on the breakfast menu, and that's no less than enticing. The Barisas found the chicken a tad dry though the white sauce was a help in this case. The vams required...and I hesitate to neologize, but I'm quoting Nose...more "candification." This may well be a



personal taste—for me, extra sugar just sends me into the outer orbits of obnubilation. The potatoes and gravy, as well as the biscuit, were very good. As I surmised. Alas, we had neither room nor time for dessert, but that will be remedied soon enough

We found the service when ordering efficient and businesslike, and the service counter side homey, personable, and warm. WildRose is a pleasant experience; they handle customers well and the atmosphere is relaxing and congenial. But bring your own Splenda!

In addition to word-of-mouth from loyal lunch and breakfast clientele, WildRose has picked up a reputation as a reputable and oft-used catering service for our area, and great things have been heard, for instance, about some of its special dinner nights held in conjunction with various Renaissance Theatre productions. You might consider this option for your next party or family get-together

Though the festival is officially hailed as a Jazz festival, the organizers pride themselves on the diversity of the musicians scheduled to play and this year's lineup has claimed to have assembled the most diverse mix of rhythm & blues, rock, jazz, country gospel world beat and more to date. With acts such as The Neville Brothers, Stevie Wonder, Billy Joel, Jimmy Buffett, Tim McGraw, Santana Sheryl Crow, Widespread Panic, Dr. John, Al Green, Diana Krall, Keyshia Cole, Robert Plant and Alison Krauss, The Raconteurs, The John Butler Trio, Irma Thomas, Elvis Costello, Kenny Wayne Sheppard and many more there literally should be something for all musical tastes.

The Festival will be held at the New Orleans Fair Grounds Race Course and musical performances are scheduled to run from 11:00 a.m. until 7:00 p.m. Eleven stages will be set up to run simultaneously, with acts being somewhat staggered to allow for some "stage hopping" to help out those who want to try to see it all.

With the official Festival set times ending well before most clubs even ice down the beer, Festival performers are known to show up at local venues throughout the city for unofficial "Night Shows" and seasoned Festival attendees start to look through local club schedules months ahead for such shows. The lagniappe you get with this Festival that you can't get at any other festival is the unparalleled Food Fair offering more than 100 varieties of authentic Louisiana cuisine and a stunning array of one-of-a-kind crafts available around the grounds in the Festival's juried crafts areas. With food offerings like Pecan Catfish Meunière, Seafood Mirliton Casserole, Fried Crab Cake w/ Smoked Tomato & Jalapeño Tartar and of course the New Orleans staples Muffulettas, Po Boys, and Crawfish Etouffée just to name a few, it is clear that this is NOT your typical festival food.

Mahalia Jackson and Duke Ellington reportedly formed the first New Orleans Jazz Festival in 1970 when while attending the Louisiana Heritage Fair in Congo Square, they came upon the Eureka Brass Band leading second-line marchers through the Festival grounds. Ms. Jackson was handed a microphone and started singing, and the rest, as they say, is history.

Tickets to Jazz Fest are on sale by specific weekend, with each ticket valid for a single day's attendance. Tickets for Thursday, May 1 are \$30 in advance, \$40 at the gate. Tickets for any other Festival day are \$40 in advance, \$50 at the gate. Children's tickets (ages 2 - 11) are only \$5 in advance or at the gate. 
